Hunger exists in every community but is especially prevalent in aging, low-income, and minority neighborhoods. Nutrition programs with educational and feeding components can reduce food insecurity, improve health, and decrease poverty-related challenges.

2. What actions did you take? What worked and didn't work toward your objectives? Please share any unanticipated benefits or barriers encountered.

Moving toward the majority of meals utilizing DoorDash delivery increased the ease of preparation of bags (all created and delivered at once) and proved to be convenient for folks (they choose their delivery time). An unanticipated benefit was the increase in the number of neighbors at low-income housing units who spread the word to increase participation, compare recipes, or jump in to help a neighbor prepare the meal.

Under the umbrella of the Rise Pantry, aFUN "Aging Families Understanding Nutrition" program helps increase vitality by introducing a healthy diet, which is critically important for older adults to thrive.

Rise works with community educators to provide **monthly** boxes of healthy foods for a complete meal, culturally-accessible learning materials in multiple languages, and the tools to prepare the foods for our low-income senior neighbors in eastern Mercer County.
